

## St. Georges display honours 5th Battalion

The St. Georges Historical Society has once again partnered with Library Allard to present a poignant Remembrance Day display that this year honours the soldiers of the 5th Battalion Canadian Mounted Rifles.

The men of this regiment were a mounted infantry unit of the Canadian Expeditionary Force during the First World War. The troops were transported to England in 1915 and in 1916, they became an infantry battalion as they fought in France and Flanders between 1916 and 1918.

Memorabilia and newspapers from Nov. 11, 1918 tell the tale of this heroic force that was referred to as the Suicide Battalion after 90 per cant of the 5,375 soldiers were killed in battle.

The movie The War Horse was based on a book written by Robert Mackay. Although the author admits that the characters in his book were fictional, the facts surrounding the plight of the men the 5th Battalion Canadian Mounted Rifles were based on factual accounts as reported by the author's grandfuther.

Visitors to the exhibit will see a decorated regiment jacket and an actual saddle used by the buttalion, along with many more artifacts of interest. A large artillery shell believed to be from a Vickers machine gun and a piece of trench art that was made by a soldier as he sat waiting in a cold, water filled trench provide a chilling reminder of the horrors these men faced on a daily basis. A war rattle used to warn soldiers of attacks with mustard gas is also part of the display.

"Our boys went off to war in hots until a British made helmet became available for their protection," said Diane Dube, president of the St. Georges Historical Society.

Original regiment hats and helmets can be viewed along with the other war related items.

Dube pointed out the transformation of the Canadian flag over the years, noting that in 1876, only seven provinces existed.

A copy of a Book of Remembrance is part of the exhibit, which includes 365 pages profiling Veterans of the First World War. The original book, along with a tribute edition commemorating the fallen soldiers of the Second World War is housed in the Peace Tower in Ottawa. Every day, tower staff members turn a page to reveal the personal profile of a soldier, and at the end of the year the book lays open to Page 365, then reverts back to Page I on Jan. I.

"The eshibit gives us the opportunity to profile some of the many books here at the library that provide documentation of the world battles," said Dube, who is also a Library Allard board

member

Significant book selections have been placed amongst the display items including The Suicide Bartation, The 1916 Experience and Brave Battalian.

This historical display will remain intact until mid November. Dube extends an invitation to everyone to come out to St. Georges and take a walk into the past. This educational exhibit will appeal to anyone with an interest in the role Canada played in the First World War. Groups are welcome and are encouraged to call ahead of time so historical society personnel can be present to address questions and provide more background information on the displayed items.

"I hope people will enjoy the display and find the history interesting," said Dube.

The exhibit also contains two new books featuring War Brides, which will be the theme of the 2016 Remembrance Day display.
